





Submitters were concerned that the snowflake as depicted was not recognizable, and did not resemble snowflakes previously registered to the Barony. Brunissende Dragonette supplied a relevant precedent:

"The use of a snowflake is grandfathered to the group.

There has been some confusion that in the cases when the use of a now prohibited charge was allowed under the grandfather clause, the depiction used in the new submission had to be the exact depiction registered. This is incorrect. In case like here, what is grandfathered to the group is the use of a snowflake. Using the exact same depiction is only required when the specific depiction of a registrable charge has become unregistrable.







There has been some confusion that in the cases when the use of a now prohibited charge was allowed under the grandfather clause, the depiction used in the new submission had to be the exact depiction registered. This is incorrect. In case like here, what is grandfathered to the group is the use of a snowflake. Using the exact same depiction is only required when the specific depiction of a registrable charge has become unregistrable.

Here, what is prohibited is the charge type: a "snowflake" and not the precise drawing they used once. Thus any reasonable and identifiable depiction of a snowflake is registrable using the grandfather clause.


Commenters were also concerned about potential conflict with the badge of Isaac de Hugo, registered in May of 1992 (via the Middle):

Azure, an estoile of eight rays within an annulet and a bordure all argent.

If there is no difference granted between an estoile and a snowflake, there may be conflict. However, no precedent was found on the matter, so this submission is commended to Wreath for consideration.

Järnhand is a byname meaning "Iron Hand" found in Svenska Akademiens Ordbok as Järn-hand <u>http://www.saob.se/artikel/?seek=j%C3%A4rne-land&pz=6#U\_J259\_208706</u> and dated to 1589.

There is a pattern of people being named after tools in Sweden and Scandinavia in general.



Submitter desires a feminine name. Language (Norse) most important.

**Dýrfinna** is a feminine given name found in GB p 9, FJ p 348; CV pp 111-112, 154 s.v. dýr, dýrr, Finnar.

**Sigurđr** is a male given name found in GB p 14; FJ pp 346, 351 s.n Sig-, varđr; CV pp 526-527 s.v. sigr, varđr; NR s.nn Sigvarđr/Sigurđr, Sig-, Varđr, siggi.

According to the rules for the formation of patronymics in GB p 17, the byname should be **Sigurdsdottir.** 

## Notes:

During commentary, ffride wlffsdotter noted "Lind col. 889 sn. Sigurðr notes the earlier form of the genitive is Sigurðar, and the later form is Sigurðz. As the submitter wants a Norse name, with the -dóttir patronymic, then I'd assume she wants an Old Norse name, and hence Dýrfinna Sigurðardóttir."

We have confirmed with the submitter that if the two name elements can be documented for temporal compatibility, she would prefer to have her originally submitted name of Dýrfinna Sigurdsðottir, and is willing to forgo her preference for "Norse".

If the elements cannot be documented for temporal compatibility, she is willing to accept the suggested change to Dýrfinna Sigurðardóttir.

ffride wlffsdotter offered the following information regarding the matter:

... the reason why you see the change from Sigurðar to ending in -s for the genitive, is because it stopped being spelled with an ð or þ and the people writing documents treated it as a d. So, looking closer at Lind, I can find -ds and -ðar/-þar, but not actually -ðs or -þs.

In commentary, ffride wlffsdotter noted that the spelling -dottir is found in 15th century Iceland in Diplomatarium Islandicum, so it is compatible in a patronym formed from the Icelandic name Roðbert.

"Luckily for the submitter, Liber documented Sarra in commentary as a 16th century German given name and Olafsdotter as a 15th century Norwegian name....In addition, ffride wlffsdotter documented the -dottir spelling using Diplomatarium Norvegicum."

Commenters felt that the ravens were difficult to recognize. With the submitter's approval, Thory Pallet has provided new artwork.





No evidence was provided, and none could be found, for armorial depictions of insects in profile in any posture other than statant. As they are non-quadrupedal, insects are unable to be statant erect, which is an explicitly quadrupedal posture.

Upon resubmission, please consult the device of Takayama Hitoshi, Sable, a mantis statant between three cherry blossoms argent, registered November 2016, for a reasonable depiction of a mantis in profile."







**Daro-** is found as a prototheme of unknown etymology in the inherited surnames Darocott, Darowell, Darowent and Darowood/Darewood, all found in the Family Search Historical Records. Daro- may be derived from the surname Dare or from the OE personal name Dēor (wild animal, deer), found in Watts, s.nn. Daresbury, Darley, Dargate; and R&W sn Dare. Of the examples listed, Darowent is probably from the ME went (way, passage). It could also be related to the town of Went, named after the River Went (Ekwall, s.n. Went)


**stur** refers to the River Stour or towns named after the river (Ekwall, s.n. Stour; Watts, s.n. River Stour). Although is is most frequently found as a prototheme (eg Watts, Stourbridge, Stourton,

Stourpaine) it also is found as a deuterotheme (Estesture, Heststhure, Swanesture). The latter, Swanesture, refers to the River Test, not the River Stour (MED), showing that it can also be found, rarely, as a generic toponym. The spelling Stur is attested as a 13th century toponymic byname.

Beider notes that "[i]n the Middle Ages, it [Yosef] was among the five names most frequently used in Germany... [and] was among the ten most common appellations in Frankfort, Prague, and Hamburg during the 17th -18th century."

Yosef appears 11 times as the name of a person on the list and 8 times as the father of a person on the list.
