Asa is a feminine Old Norse name found in GB, p 8. It is marked as a Landnamabok name, with 1 instance. The name in GB is shown with the accent on the first a, but the submitter prefers to have accents dropped.

The byname is intended to mean 'wife of Danr'.

Danr is a masculine Old Norse name found in GB, p 9, combined with -kona; the Norse word for 'wife' as found in "The Bynames of the Viking Age Runic Inscriptions - Names of Wives" by Lindorm Eriksson. https://www.s-gabriel.org/names/lindorm/runicbynames/wives.htm#start. The genitive Dans- is formed according to GB, p. 17.

Submitter desires a masculine name. No major changes. Meaning (Caius Ignatius Pontianus) most important.

Caius is a praenomen found in "A Simple Guide to Imperial Roman Names" by Ursula Georges (http://heraldry.sca.org/names/roman.html), along with the pattern of the tria nomina (praenomen + nomen + cognomen).

Ignatius is a nomen from the Epigraphic Database, dated to the first century, which reads, in part. D(is) M(anibus) / Dialla[g]e / filiae dulcissimae / Ignatius et / Corinthias parentes https://edh-www.adw.uni-heidelberg.de/edh/inschrift/HD010416

Pontianus is a Roman cognomen found in the Epigraphic Database Heidelberg, transcription HD039813 (Canonical URI:

https://edh-www.adw.uni-heidelberg.de/edh/inschrift/HD039813&lang=en). The inscription is dated between 101-200 CE, and is found in what is now Algeria: Transcription: D(is) M(anibus) s(acrum) / C(aius) Aemili/us Ponti/anus v(ixit) a(nnos) / XXXXXV h(ic) s(itus) est

Note that under the new clarification of the Unity of Orientation and Posture rules, a humanoid head and serpents do not have comparable postures or orientations, so we do not believe that there is an issue with UoO/UoP with this arrangement. http://heraldry.sca.org/loar/2019/07/19-07cl.html#6

There was some discussion at the kingdom level whether the name would better be spelled "Caius" or "Gaius", a question that we forward for Alys Pelican's consideration. Additional documentation for Caius was found by Muirenn Blue Tyger - <Caius> appears as a prae nomen in "Inscriptions of Roman Tripolitania"

There was also some discussion as to whether the secondary charges were recognizable at the size they are drawn. We were unable to secure approval for updated artwork from the submitter, so we forward this emblazon for Wreath's consideration.

Dyddgu is a female given name from the 16th century found in Women's Names in the First Half of 16th Century Wales by Tangwystyl verch Morgant Glasvryn http://heraldry.sca.org/names/welshfem16/given.html

Aberistwith is an alternate spelling for Aberystwyth dated to 1641 in Harley Manuscript 18760, per correspondence with a curator from the Llyfrgell Genedlaethol Cymru (National Library of Wales).

Per "A Simple Guide to Constructing 16th Century Welsh Names" by Tangwystyl verch Morgant Glasvryn <u>http://heraldry.sca.org/names/welsh16.html</u> :Place-names may appear as inherited surnames, but in many cases the place involved is the village or region where the person lives. The name of the place appears by itself, without using of or any other connector.

Notes:

Aberistwith is an alternate spelling for Aberystwyth dated to 1641 in Harley Manuscript 18760, per correspondence with a curator from the Llyfrgell Genedlaethol Cymru (National Library of Wales). That correspondence says, in part,

"...thank you for your query regarding the spelling of Aberystwyth. During the Victorian era 'Aberystwith' was the common spelling. By 1900 both versions 'Aberystwith' & 'Aberystwyth' seemed to be in usage.

As regards 'Aberstwith' I suspect this is an incorrect version probably by someone not familiar with the area or perhaps also Welsh place-names. There have been numerous spellings over the centuries for example in 1561 'Aberistwth' was used ; in MS volume

(No. 18760, of the Harley MSS) in the British Museum which dates from 1641 uses 'Aberistwith'..."

Kingdom was unable to obtain images of the MS in question, and asks for assistance in doing so if Pelican deems it necessary

Anastasia is a feminine given name dated to 1577 in Walraven von Nijmegen "Hungarian Feminine Names" (http://heraldry.sca.org/names/magfem2.html), s.n. Anasztazia.

The naming pattern in Hungarian is byname + given according to SENA Appendix A.

Per Kolosvari Arpadne Julia, the name spelling "Futtoth" is from 1533.

Lucie is also found as a feminine given name in English in "Names from Early English Wills" by Sara L. Uckelman known in the SCA as Aryanhwy merch Catmael. The author lists 2 instances dated to 1411.(http://www.ellipsis.cx/~liana/names/english/earlyenglishwills.html)

de Bayonne is a byname found in "Names Found in Commercial Documents from Bordeaux, 1470-1520" by Aryanhwy merch Catmael. http://www.ellipsis.cx/~liana/names/french/bordeaux.html

Pattern given + locative formed according to SENA Appendix A

The mixing of an English given name and a French byname is allowable according to SENA Appendix C.

The submitter's previous device "Per pale indented azure and purpure, two ibexes rampant respectant, that in dexter inverted argent." was returned 2018/04 LOAR (http://heraldry.sca.org/loar/2018/04/18-04lar.html#185):

This device is returned for violation of SENA A3D2c, which requires that "The charges within a charge group should be in either identical postures/orientations or an arrangement that includes posture/orientation." The dexter ibex is inverted, which must be explicitly blazoned separately from the sinister ibex. Also, longstanding precedent does not allow inverted animate charges in SCA heraldry except when in a recognized arrangement such as in annulo. The submitter provided evidence of an ibex inverted in period manuscripts; however, none were in a heraldic context. Without such evidence the longstanding precedent does not allow inverted animate charges in SCA heraldry except when in a recognized arrangement such as in annulo.

This version puts the ibexes in annulo as recommended on the return.

From the December 2017 cover letter:

* From Wreath: Charges In Annulo

In annulo is a term used to describe charges arranged in such a way that they form an annulet, or circle. It's possible for a number (usually 6 or more) of any type of charge to be in annulo by arranging them so their centers follow a circle, and certain long, skinny charges like serpents or stag's attires can be in annulo with only one charge. However, when there are five or fewer charges in the charge group, the ability of charges to represent an annular formation becomes more difficult, depending on the shape and orientation of the charges. Three wolves rampant, heads to center, cannot be in annulo, because their arrangement and orientation do not suggest an annulet. However, three wolves courant can be in annulo, provided their bodies curve and conform to the shape of an annulet. Although the example given is for three quadrupeds, we feel that 2 quadrupeds are still recognizable as courrant and gives the appearance of an annulet.

An incorrect black and white emblazon was used at the kingdom level - that has been corrected for the external letter.

No major changes. Client requests authenticity for English. Meaning (Burner of ships) most important.

Nausicaa is a feminine given name in Greek that was mentioned in the Odyssey. The Odyssey was translated into English in 1581, as well as twice more before 1600, according to Wikipedia. The name appears in a just post-1600 translation (the first one that is considered good enough to have survived easily) as Nausicaa

There is a pattern of classical names used as given names in the 16th century in England.

Bithewater Appears as an English surname dating to 1279 in Reaney & Wilson p.78

Given name + Surname is a normal English Pattern SENA Appendix A, and the name elements are found within 500 years of each other as required by SENA Appendix C.

Submitter desires a feminine name. Spelling (Rionach) most important.

Rionach is a post-hyphen spelling in OC&M, Rignach is the earlier form. Rignach is the name of a saint in the gray period Martyrology of Gorman (her feast day is Dec 18).

The submitter wanted 'Rhynn', looking for name with similar sound.

Submitter prefers the later spelling because the desired pronunciation is more obvious to modern English speakers.

Daigre is a masculine given name in Mari Elspeth nic Bryan "Index of Names in Irish Annals" (http://medievalscotland.org/kmo/AnnalsIndex/), dated to 814 and 1056. The genitive is not known; we ask for assistance with the proper formation of the patronymic.

inghen is the earlier period spelling of the word indicating "daughter of." The submitter allows for changes if the spelling needs to be changed to match the time period of the patronymic.

Notes:

This name is returned for lack of temporal compatibility between name elements, as discussed in SENA PN.2.C. Even with the most generous dating of the Martyrology of Gorman to 1600, there is greater than 500 years difference between the name elements. (<u>http://heraldry.sca.org/sena.html#PN2C</u>). Unfortunately, since kingdoms cannot create holding names, the device is returned along with the name.

Upon resubmission, the submitter is advised to draw the crescent and the stag both at equivalent sizes, with neither crossing the fess line of the shield, in order to preserve the impression of the charges as being co-primary.

Signý is found as a feminine given name in Geirr Bassi, p. 14.

The descriptive byname **'otr'** (meaning "otter") is constructed. It is found as a word in Cleasby Vigfusson and is attested as a man's given name by the Viking Answer Lady (http://www.vikinganswerlady.com/ONMensNames.shtml). This follows the pattern of descriptive bynames based on animals. There are extensive different examples - including fish, mammals, and birds. A few are included below. The closest examples are 'beaver' and 'mouse.'

Batch #P00582-1 The spelling sojourner is found as a common noun in a 1644 English edition of the Bible (https://books.google.com/books?id=QMxIAAAAcAAJ&pg=RA5-PP1), showing that it is also plausible for use of the surname in the 17th C, which can then be used as a given name [Alton of Grimfells, Apr 2010, A-East].

Haarlem is a Dutch place found in Jasper Tournay, Van de Erfzonde Disputatie tusschen de predicanten tot Haarlem, published in 1610 (https://books.google.com/books?id=Yq1IAAAAcAAJ&pg=PP3).

The Dutch locative preposition van is found in Appendix A of SENA, and English and Dutch can be combined per Appendix C of SENA

The submitter would prefer to omit diacritical marks.
