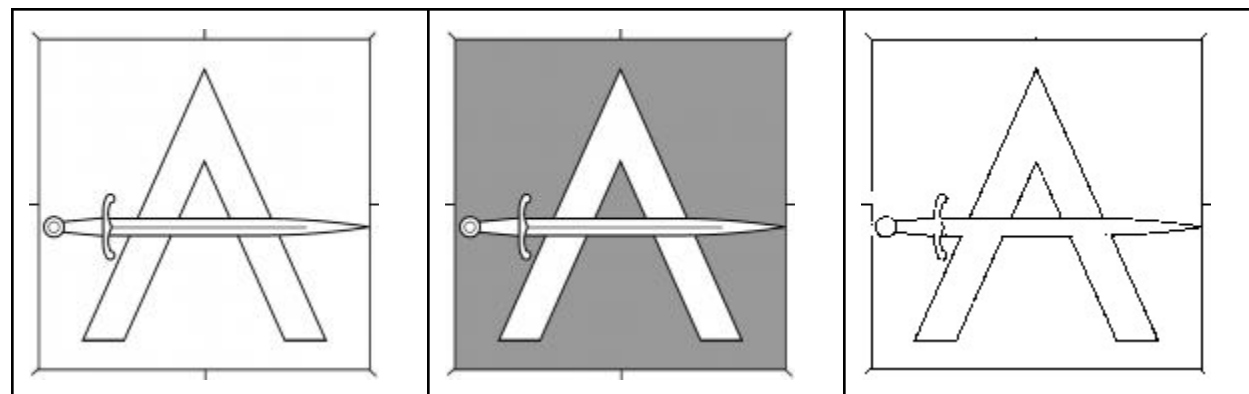

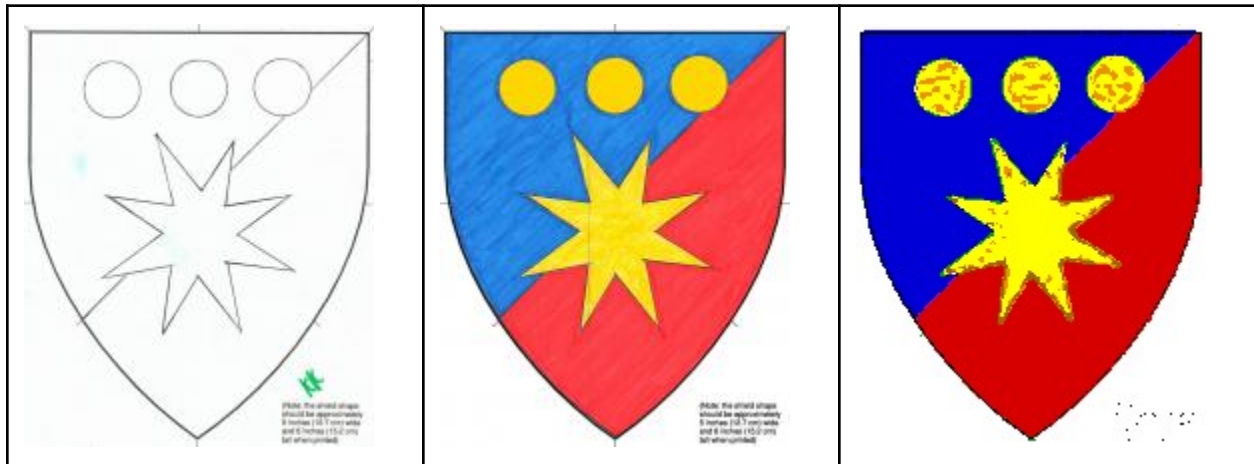

**Ceara** is a saint's name, per the 1630 edition of *The Martyrology of Donegal*, p375, as translated from the Irish

(<http://archive.org/stream/themartyrologyof00adamuoft#page/n436/mode/1up>). By precedent, Ceara is considered Early Modern Irish Gaelic. [Cera filia drusti, 9/2002]

**of Anglespur**: The Shire of Anglespur is a branch of the SCA. This branch-name was registered in May of 1981 (via the East).

**Coldwood** is the name of an SCA branch, registered in October of 1991 via the East.

This device must be returned for conflict with the device of Koia Karasova, *(Fieldless) A sun per pale sable and Or*. There is a DC for adding the field but nothing for the difference between a compass star and a sun (SENA Appendix M1g).

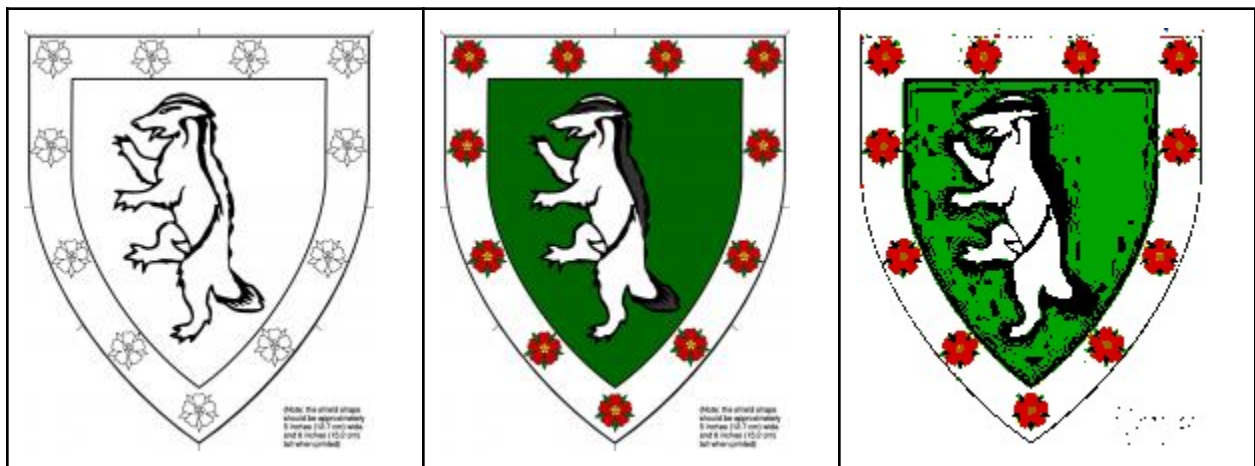

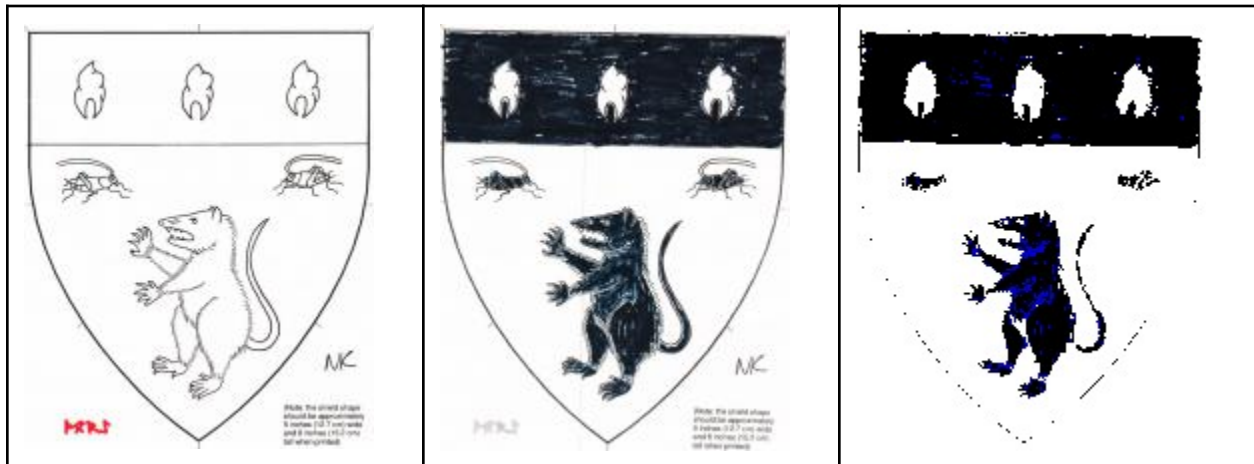

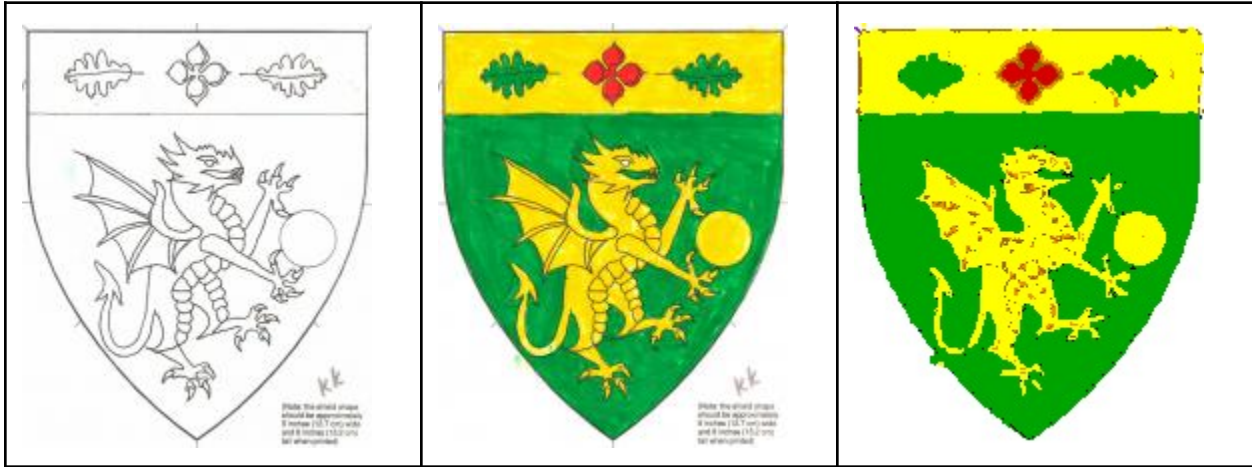
This name combines a French given name and an English byname, an acceptable lingual mix per SENA Appendix C.

#### Notes:

Commenters at Kingdom pointed out that the argent charges partially overlapping the argent sections of the field may be an issue. Wahriia of Saint Christina the Astonishing provided new art that attempts to address this issue, which has been approved by the submitter; while Kingdom is not certain that any redraw will be sufficient in this case, we prefer to forward it regardless.

Language/Culture (Norse) most important.

**Evja** is an Old Norse feminine given name found in GB p 9, marked as from the Landnamabok.

**Draconis** is in Bahlow Gentry p 85 sn Draa(c)k Dracke (LGer); dragon NHG Drache UGer, Drach; SW Ger also a house, sn n thus in Frkt "zum Drachen" J van Demme Drachin, Trier 1357, C Drache Frkf 1357. *Draconis* is the expected Latinization with German SFCP. *Draconis* is additionally the submitter's legal surname, verified by Rhiannon Morgaine and Fina Black Lion from their driver's license.

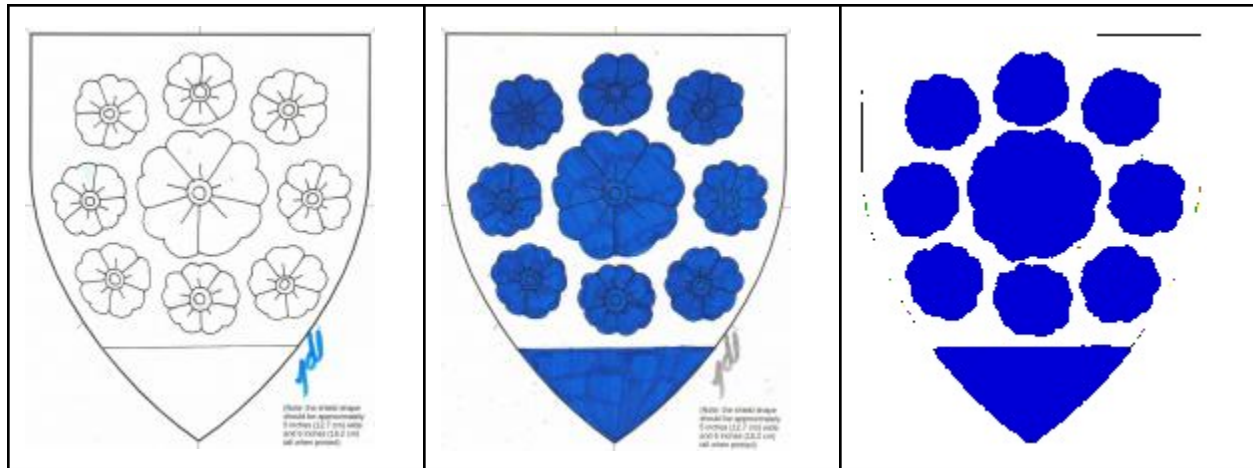

Client requests authenticity for Japan 1550-1600.

Sound (li, with double i's, Toe-mee-co) most important.

The submitter's desired period and culture is 1550-1600 Japan. The desired sound is equally important to the submitter.

li - NCMJ pg 319 (3rd edition), historical surname, *li*, dated 1392 and 1600. The submitter would prefer to omit the apostrophe in the name. Other editions of this source give the name as *li*.

**Tomiko** - NCMJ pg 386, historical feminine name, Tomiko, dated 1572.

Examples of size and arrangement of the pattern of nine charges, one large surrounded by 8 smaller of the same type:

- The arrangement of nine circles (Plate 7, Ito Morimasa 1600 from A Roll of Japanese Armory by Solveig Thronardottir)
- Nine apricot leaves "replacing the stars in the nine star arrangement" (O-umajirushi page xxiv "About Mon")
- Nine whirlpools (O-umajirushi Volume 4, Plate 27 and 28 (142-143))

Examples of the flower charge:

- "China flower" used in the mon f (with four petals) in O-umajirushi, page xxiv, "About Mon", described on page xxvi (pictured with five petals) in the same
- Pictured as part of the mon also on plate 7, under Oda Hidenobu, with five petals, from A Roll of Japanese Armory (<https://s-gabriel.org/heraldry/solveig/kamon>)

- Called a Cherry Blossom, pictured with five petals, from An Illustrated Encyclopedia of Japanese Family Crests. Graphic-sha, 2001. pg. 172 fig. 15 (<http://mon.xavid.us/Mon/Cherry%20Blossom>)

Examples of the base:

- Vol. 3, p. 16 (p. 93) of O-umajirushi shows the use of a base, both without any other charge and with a primary charge.
- Vol 5, p. 5 (p 155); Vol. 5, p 24 (p. 174); and Vol 6, p 21 (p. 209) all show a base combined with a primary charge group.

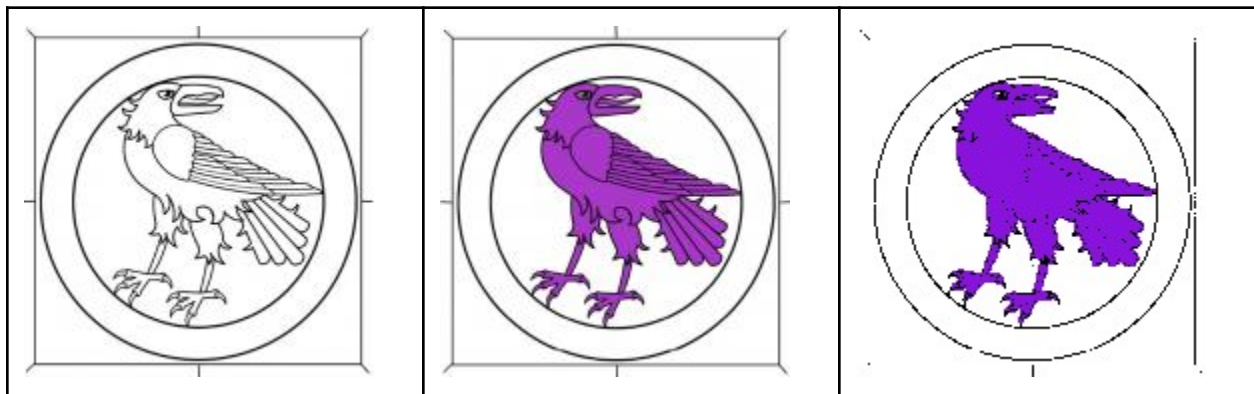
It is the submitter's belief that this is an attested motif/arrangement that should not require an IAP.

Notes:

Heralds at the kingdom decision meeting believe that this IAP additionally requires examples of azure charges on an argent field; we request the assistance of the College in sourcing those.

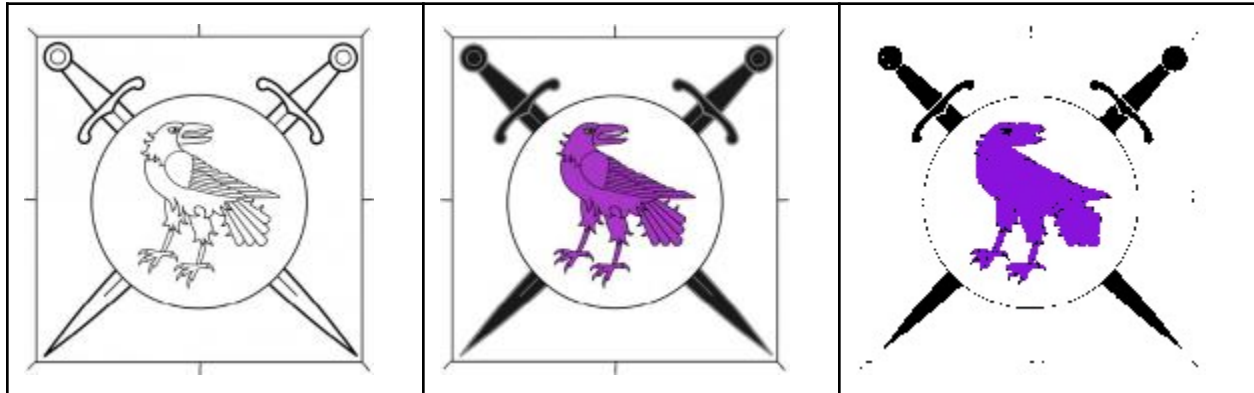

Per recent changes to SENA A3A2, we believe this design does not violate the prohibition on forms of heraldic (armorial) display being used alone in fieldless designs:

Forms of heraldic (armorial) display may not be used alone in fieldless designs unless they are uncharged and of an undivided tincture that we do not protect.[...]Forms of heraldic (armorial) display may not be used with other charges in fieldless designs when those other charges appear to be part of a heraldic achievement of an armorial display. Period examples include, but are not limited to, a single supporter or two supporters holding armorial display in a variety of forms, including escutcheons, flags, and others; helms or crowns atop the armorial display; ribbons below the display; or a charge in annulo surrounding the display.

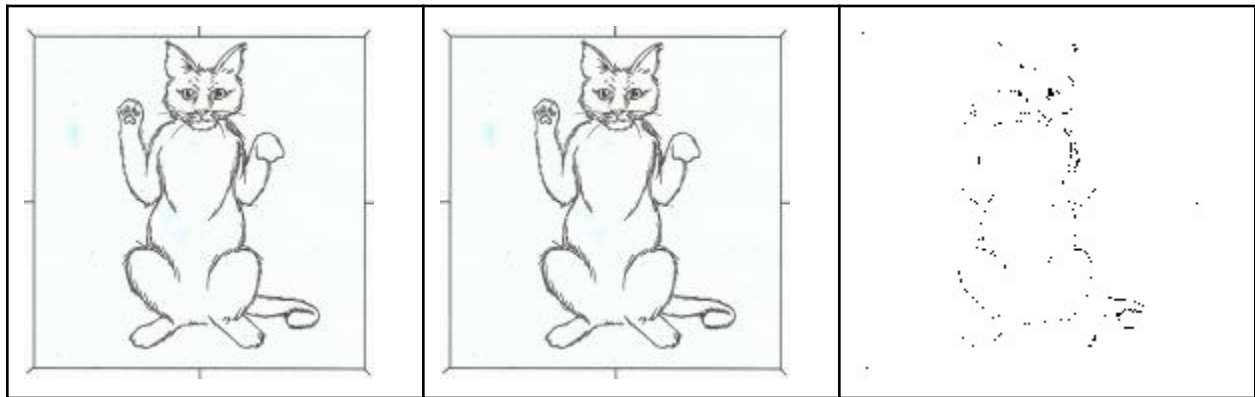
We are unaware of swords in saltire having been used as part of heraldic achievements in period, and we therefore forward this design for Wreath's consideration.

This badge is returned for conflict with the badge of Khaalid al-Jaraad: *(Fieldless) A cat sejant erect affronty argent*. There is one DC for fieldlessness, but none for the raised forepaw, as SENA A5G7a is explicit that the change in position of a head or tail, or of a single leg, is not sufficient to count as a distinct change.

**Katlyne** is a feminine given name dated 1446-1553 in Sara L. Uckelman and Kym Banoczi, "Names from Antwerp, 1443-1561" (<https://www.ellipsis.cx/~liana/names/dutch/plaiser.html>).

**MacAulay** is a header in Black. Dated forms include *McAulay* (1326) and *Makcaulay* (1638). Scribal abbreviations like Mc- must be expanded to Mac-. [9/2007 CL]

Names from the Dutch and English/Welsh regional naming groups can be combined per Appendix C of SENA.

As noted by the submitter, this badge is jointly owned by Antonio Giancarlo Nicastrì (as the secondary owner). Per Admin Handbook II.D.2.d, upon release of a jointly-owned badge by the primary owner, the badge will become solely owned by the secondary owner.

**Maria** is a Spanish Catalan given name found in the DNMES dated to 1248 (<https://dmnes.org/cite/Maria/1248/RusGeb>).

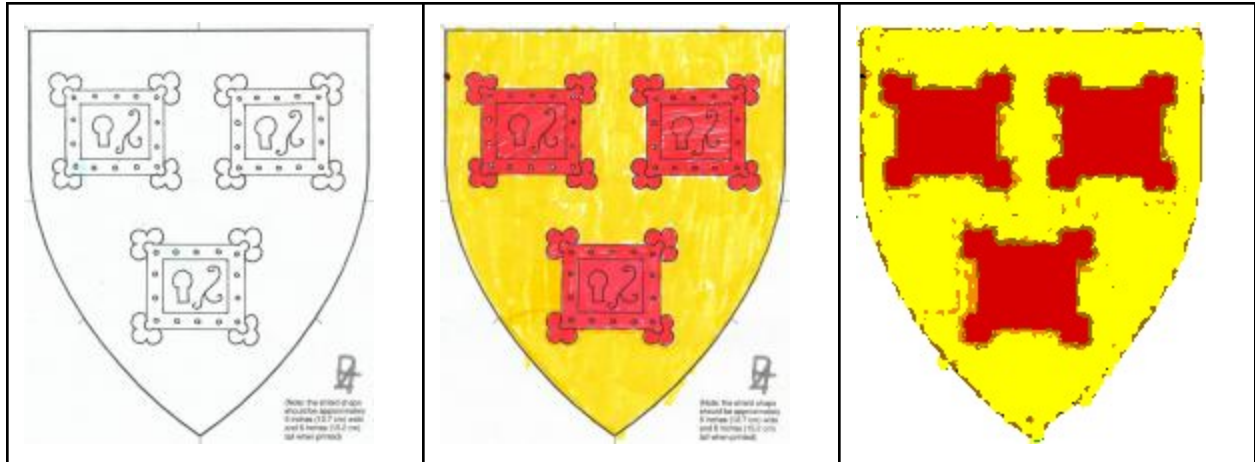
**la Morada** is a Spanish descriptive byname meaning 'the purple.' We find Morada in the Family Search Records as the christening of Ynes de Torgmada Morada, 6 June 1547, Santiago Apostol, Valladolid, Spain, batch # C87105-1. We can use the marker *la* per SENA Appendix A for Spanish, which says that although usually the article *la* is omitted, it is sometimes known.

There is a note on the form that "If *la Morada* cannot be justified, will accept *la Purpura*. Does not want *Morada* meaning pig fat." It is unclear which form is actually desired/dispreferred.

**Matthew** is dated to 1400 in "English Names found in Brass Inscriptions" by Julian Goodwyn (<https://heraldry.sca.org/names/brasses/>).

**MacAngus** is the header in Black with a dated spelling *Makangus* in 1492. Mak- and Mac- were used interchangeably.

The door lock (or lock-plate) is a period charge, found in the arms of Grierson of Lag, 1582 [Dunvegan Armorial, fol. 425]. This may be the defining instance of a door lock.

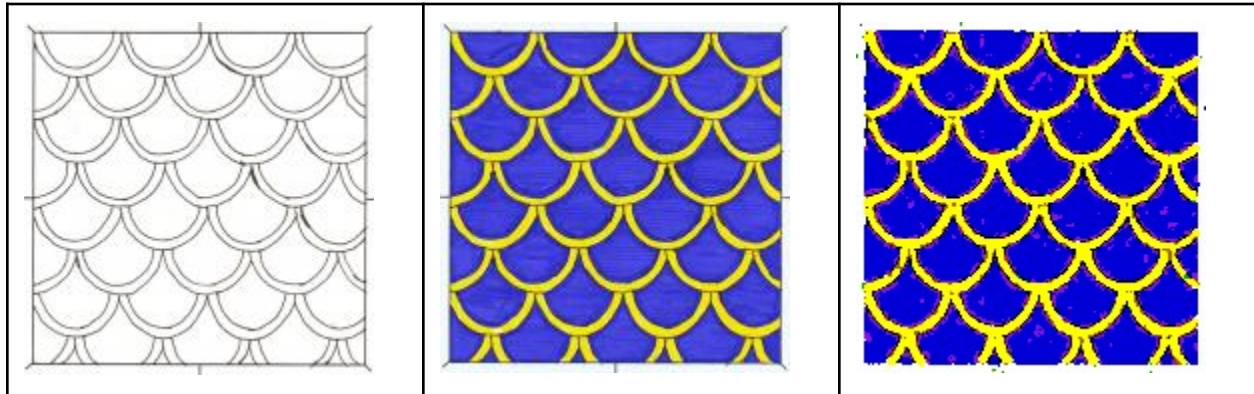

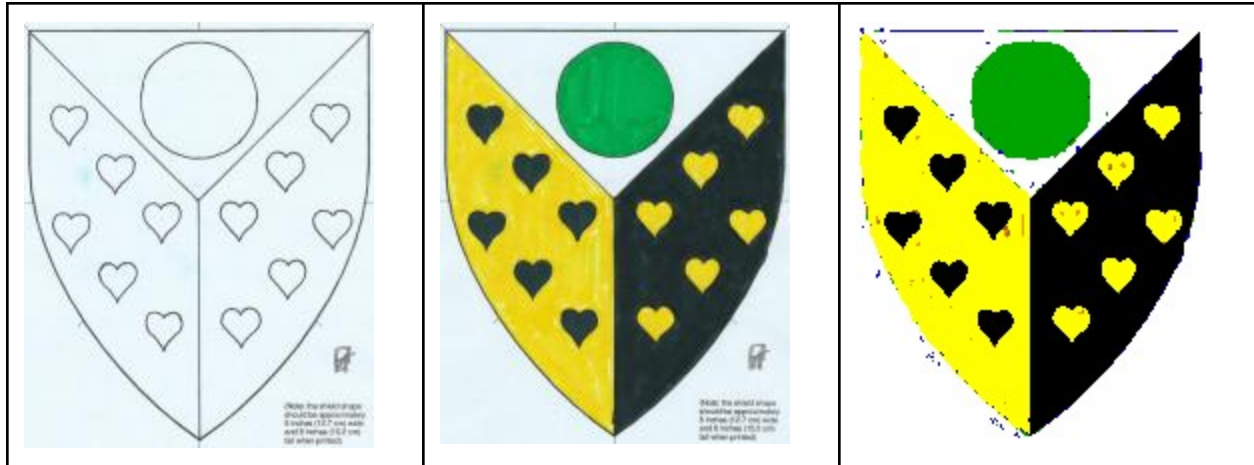
Heralds at the kingdom-level decision meeting raised the question of whether field treatments are significantly different from plain tinctures for the purposes of conflict; we note that SENA A5F2 explicitly states that "The addition of a field treatment is also a change of tincture"; this is reiterated in A5G1a: "Furs and fields with field treatments are considered different tinctures from their underlying tincture and from other variants which share an underlying tincture."

This badge will be recolored for the external level; the image at kingdom was clearly azure, not purple, and while the submitter prefers azure, they were advised that *Azure papellony Or* is not clear of conflict, and chose purple instead.

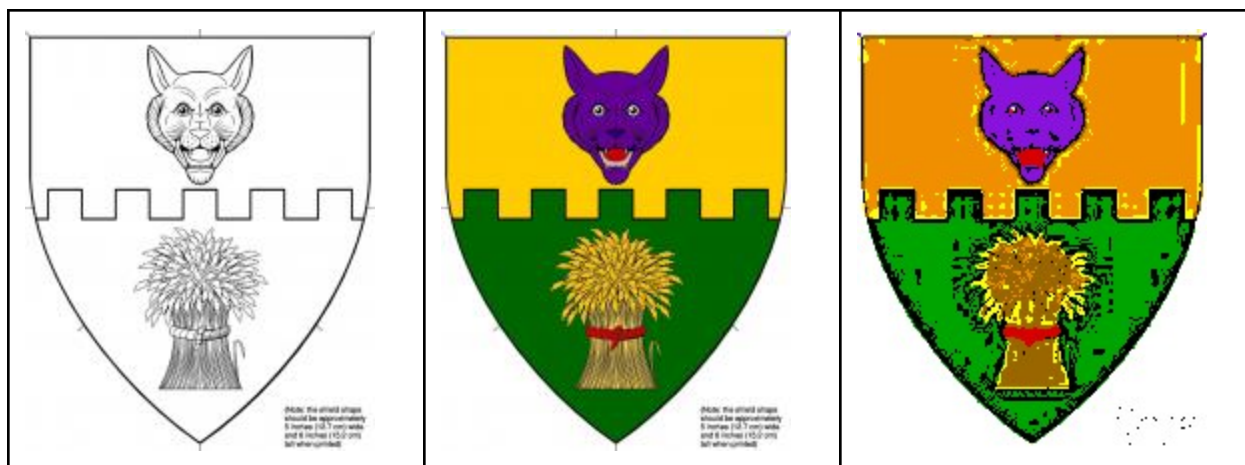

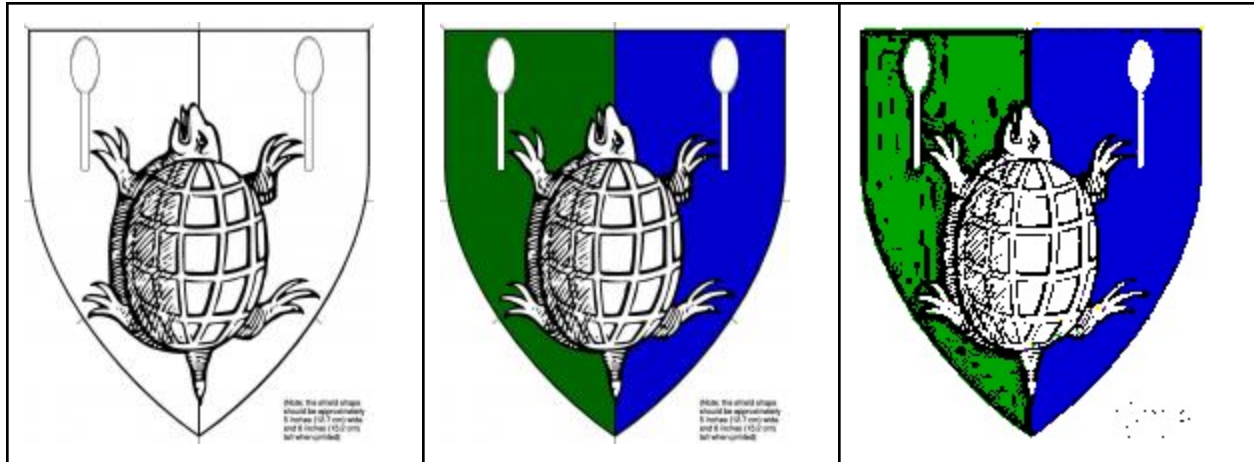

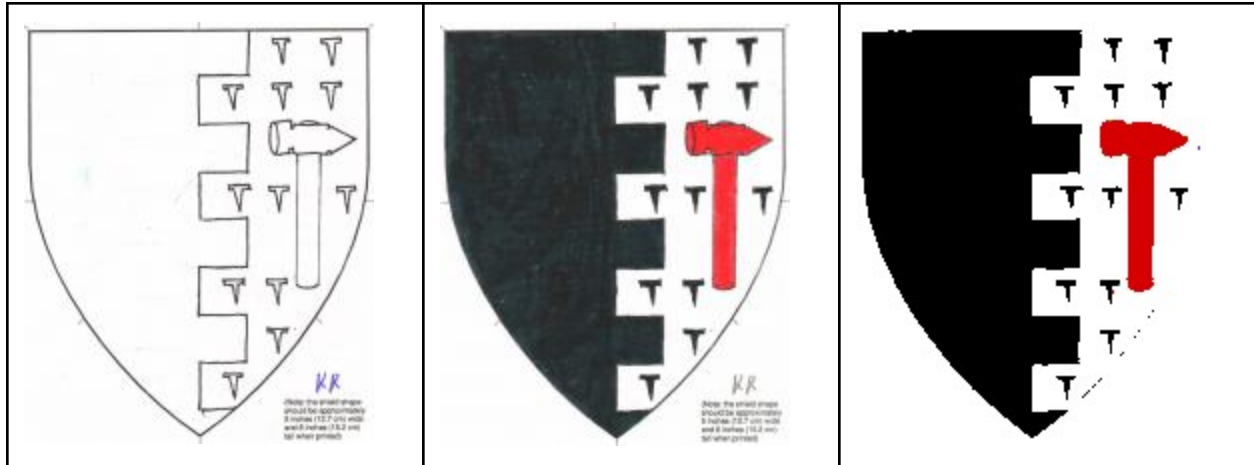
**Ranulf** can be found in "Members of Knightly Orders" by Ursula Georges (<https://www.s-gabriel.org/names/ursula/ordermembers.html>) dated to 1388 in *Polychronicon*.

**de l'Île du Dragon Dormant** - Baronnie de l'Île du Dragon Dormant is a group in the SCA; the name was registered in April 2013. The Branch Name Allowance usually requires the use of the word 'of', so this would be 'Ranulf of l'Île du Dragon Dormant' except that the submitter lives in an area where French is spoken as a primary language. The submitter's address is in Quebec, which is part of French Canada.

Spelling (Ronan to remain as submitted) most important.

**Rónán** is a male given name found in "100 Most Popular Men's Names in Early Medieval Ireland" by Tangwystal verch Morgant Glasvyrn (<http://heraldry.sca.org/names/irish100.html>). It is also a saint's name, which allows it to be used in a wide temporal time frame.

**Pádraig**: Irish Masculine given name, dated under a variety of spellings between 1205 CE and 1578 CE. From Kathleen M. O'Brien's "Index of Names in Irish Annals" (<http://medievalscotland.org/kmo/AnnalsIndex/Masculine/Padraig.shtml>).

To form the patronymic byname, add **mac** to a male name.

Submitter is interested in knowing what the authentic form would look like so he can decide if he would be interested in the most authentic form but would like to ensure *Ronan* remains as submitted.

Notes:

In commentary, Alys Ogress provided a wealth of information to meet the submitter's request to know what the authentic form would be, which Blue Tyger staff sent to the submitter. Having received no response, we are forwarding this name as-is. For Pelican's use, however, here is a summary:

Whether or not *Mac* is capitalized in a Gaelic name actually has a meaning. A capitalized *Mac* usually indicates "family of X" not the literal "son of X" the submitter may be intending. The "son of X" meaning uses uncapitalized *mac*. [See 6/2002 CL and Gregor Mac Beathain, 3/2008 LoAR, A-Ansteorra]

While both the elements *Rónán* and *Pádraig* are found in Gaelic names in the late 12th and early 13th centuries (per Mari's "Index", linked above) and it's therefore reasonable

to say that this name could be authentic for circa 1200 as *Rónán mac Pádraig*, the fact that Pádraig is a saint's name means that in actual usage, the much more common form of it would be *Rónán mac Máel Pátraic*, meaning "son of the servant of Patrick." In this form, the name is both authentic and reasonably commonplace for the 9th, 10th, and 11th centuries.

Kingdom commenters questioned whether the embattled line as depicted is too far to sinister. Similar depictions in recent years have been registered with merely an Artist's Note (Bollí Gunnarsson, 1/2018, A-Aethelmearc, e.g.); we therefore do not believe that the placement is sufficiently incorrect to warrant return or redraw at Kingdom.

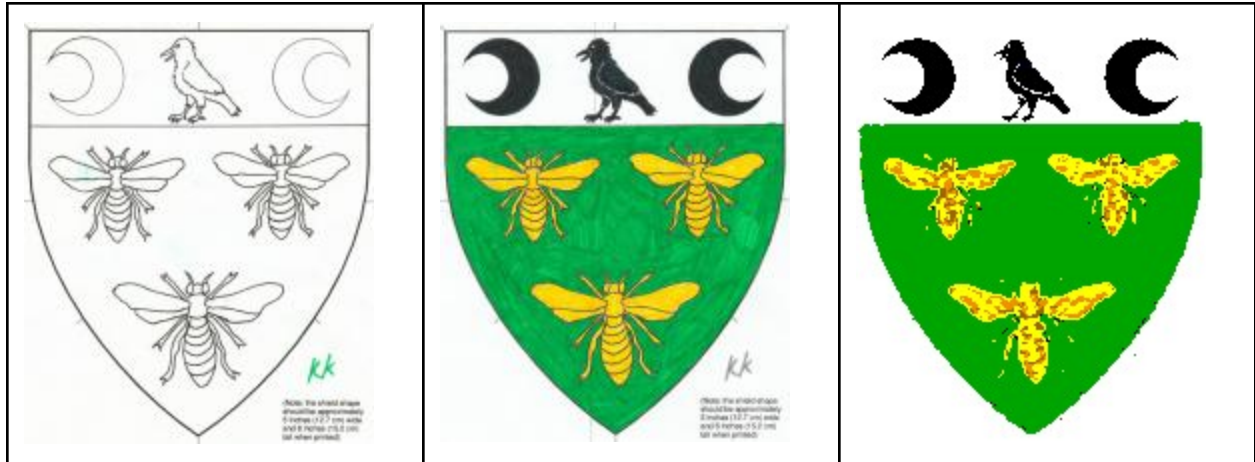

This device is returned for violation of SENA A3E2, which limits armory to a maximum complexity count of 8. This device has a complexity count of nine, with four tinctures (Or, purpure, vert, argent) and five types of charges (leaves, quatrefoil, dragon, roundel).

 Sound (wants something of Tov/f and Elwyn) most important.

**Tofa** is an Old Norse feminine given name found in Geirr Bassi p.15.

**Elwyn** is an English surname derived from the given name *Elwin/Aylwin*. The dated examples s.v. Elwin/Elwyn in Bardsley include *Elwyn le Heyward* 1273 and *William Elwin* 1273. It is additionally found as a surname in "Surnames in 15th Century York" by Karen Larsdatter (<http://heraldry.sca.org/names/york15/surnames-alphabetical.htm>).

English and Old Norse were close enough geographically for names to overlap per Appendix C.

Notes:

Appendix C permits name elements in English and Scandinavian to be combined only if both elements are attested prior to 1100 C.E. [See, e.g., Eugene Haraldson, 11/2017 LoAR, A-Atenveldt]. Therefore, the 13th and 15th century citations for *Elwyn* here do not support combining that element with an Old Norse feminine given name. However, we can document *Tova* as a standardized Old English name found in Sawyer Charter 1425, which is dated to 1049 x 1052 (<https://esawyer.lib.cam.ac.uk/charter/1425.html>). Like header forms in PASE, this standardized academic form should be registerable.

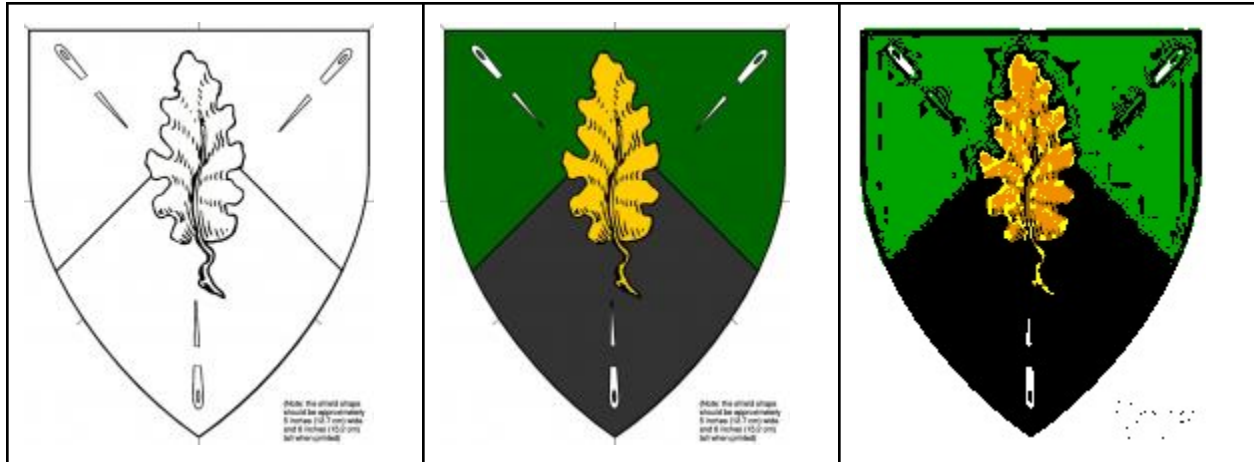
We are therefore forwarding this name as *Tova Elwyn*, which is within the submitter's allowed changes.

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**28. Ulivetta Zenobia Aurelia Sartore Buscharino**

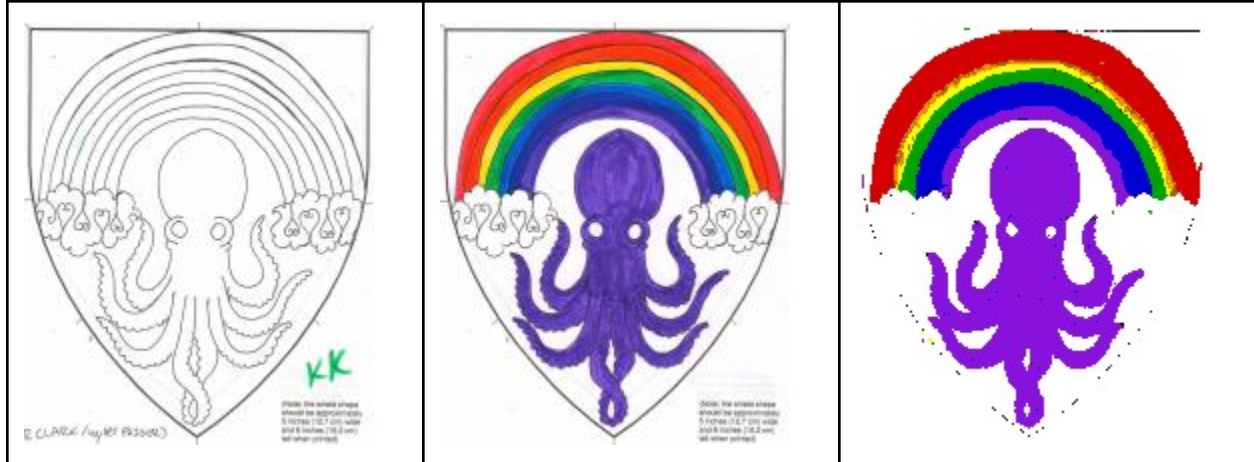

**Wylet** is a Scots feminine given name found in the Family Search Historical Records: Wilet Jamesoun; Female; Christening; 6 Jul 1610; South Leith, Midlothian, Scotland; Batch: C19503-1 (<https://www.familysearch.org/ark:/61903/1:1:FQM7-8VL>), i/y swap attested to Scots.

**Fraser** is a Scots byname found in Aryanhwy merch Catmael's "Index of Scots names found in Dictionary of the Older Scottish Tongue" (<https://www.ellipsis.cx/~liana/names/scots/dost/fraser.html>), dated 1581.

Submitter requests that if a conflict is found (potential conflict: Violet Frasier (Apr. 2012, Middle)), the name *Wylet Fraysser of Invernes* be submitted instead. **Invernes** is a Scottish place name found in "Index of Scots Names found in Dictionary of the Older Scottish Tongue" (<https://www.ellipsis.cx/~liana/names/scots/dost/inverness.html>) dated to 1544.

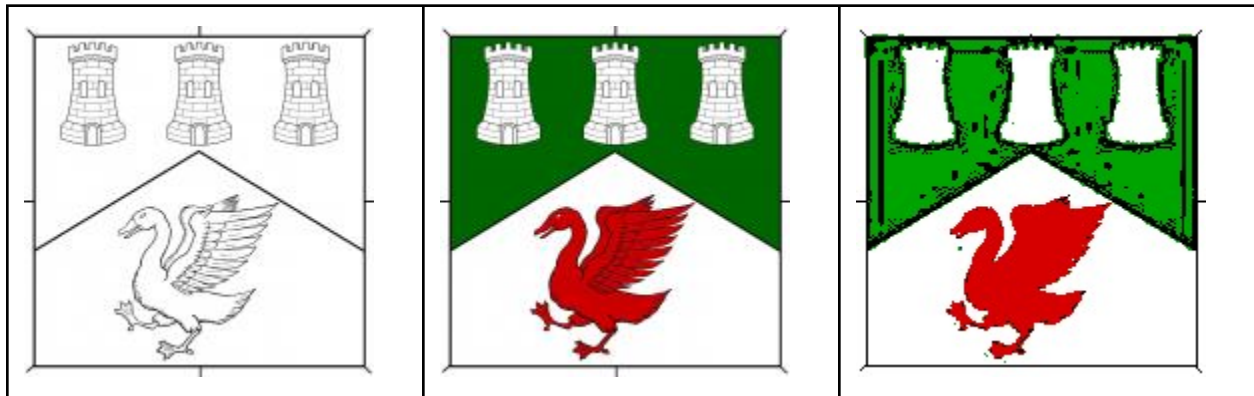

**Chad** is an English saint's name, found in PASE as a header form, which are registerable by precedent [Thurgar Oddsson, June 2016, A-Outlands]. It is also an English surname found in FamilySearch: Elizabeth, wife of William Chad, burial 1649 in Norfolk, England, image 118. English surnames can be used as given names (App A of SENA) and then borrowed into German (Feb 2015 Cover Letter).

The submitter would prefer the spelling *Tschad* if it can be documented.

**von Lübeck** is a German locative byname. *Lubeck* is dated in that spelling to 1585 and found on a map by Kupferdruck and published by Mercator ([http://biblio.unibe.ch/web-apps/maps/zoomify.php?pic=Ryh\\_5201\\_1.jpg&col=ryh](http://biblio.unibe.ch/web-apps/maps/zoomify.php?pic=Ryh_5201_1.jpg&col=ryh)).
